t's a real pleasure to be asked to write the Foreword for the second edition of Great British Education. This publication plays a wonderful role in helping promote the strength and quality of the UK education sector to prospective parents and students overseas.

Since the publication of last year's edition, I'm delighted to have been appointed as the UK government's International Education Champion. As Champion, I will be supporting the implementation of the International Education Strategy, jointly published by the Department for International Trade and Department for Education. This strategy sets out steps to achieve our ambitions of increasing education exports to £35bn by 2030,

and to increase the number of international students hosted in the UK by 600,000 in the same time period.

While my background is in higher education, I'm thrilled to have the opportunity to promote the whole of the UK's education offer, including educational technology, technical vocational education and training, English language training, schools and early years. Like higher education, the UK's expertise in these education sub-sectors is world leading.

2020 was far from easy, including for many of us in the education sector. The UK was one of the first countries to respond to the educational challenges posed by Covid-19 by introducing comprehensive immigration flexibility. Furthermore, the recent introduction of the Student Route and Graduate Route means we have a world-class student visa offer befitting our world-class higher-education sector.

I'm extremely proud of the resilience and agility that the UK education sector has demonstrated in recent months. For example, British Educational Suppliers Association (BESA) EdTech members provided £36m of free resources to educational institutions and governments globally, from March to June last year.

The Boarding Schools' Association has introduced a Covid-safe charter and BSA helped arrange chartered flights to bring students to the UK, ensuring students were welcomed and well looked-after upon arrival. And from vocational colleges to universities and English language training centres, we're seeing innovative examples of high quality online and blended learning for both domestic and international students.

I'm delighted to support *Great British Education* in its endeavours. I do hope that this magazine continues to inspire young people to invest in their future and make lifelong friends by studying in the UK.

Great Britain exerts a profound and wide-ranging influence on the world. With a long track record of producing game-changing ideas across the field of human learning, its captains of industry, scientists and innovators are prized and respected. # 21st century Britain


This deep truth captures the spirit of a nation that places a very high value on educating the next generation. A nation whose history, buildings and institutions stretch far back into the distant mists of time, Great Britain's eyes are nonetheless fixed firmly on a future of innovation and collaboration.

The UK is still a major political and economic force, with membership in the G8 and an economy that is the fifth largest in the world and second largest in Europe. Democracies around the world owe much to the political systems that evolved in Britain. The 'mother' of parliaments is based in the Palace of Westminster, under the watchful presence of Big Ben. British Prime Minsters – famous or notorious – are known around the globe and the view from London is one that is sought and respected by international leaders.

prompts justified soul-searching, but also means that the nation has benefited from a vivid range of international influences, helping to create the multicultural society that exists today. There's also a strong sense of regional identity, a pride of place, which fuels a strong sense of belonging. The rivalry between football teams; the extraordinary variation of dialects and accents; the local customs and traditions – these are fuelled by loyalty and community spirit that gives each part of the UK its own distinctive personality.

# The individual child

For centuries, a Great British education has been admired as setting the global gold standard for excellence. It reaches from the early monastic communities of the sixth century CE, to the founding of the first universities in the middle ages, to the arrival of charitable schools under Royal Charter in the time of Shakespeare, through to the Victorian age and into modern times. A long and gradual process of change and evolution



has always had scholarship at its heart. The distinguished reputation of a British education is founded on the cornerstones of academic rigour, intellectual curiosity and freedom of expression. In an age where opinion and fact are too often muddled, the British education system stands firmly grounded in the noble pursuit of learning and truth.

# **Academic rigour and pastoral care**

British schools are celebrated for their academic results and individualised pastoral care; and its universities lead ground-breaking

research and provide challenges for hundreds of thousands of students. Steeped in heritage, this education fosters innovation and creativity, placing the individual at the heart of all things.

International students flock to the UK to study for a number of well-tested reasons. The climate of intellectual freedom; the global network of connections; the ease of movement between such diverse stimulating centres of learning; the warm and friendly welcome. Above all, they're drawn by the vast wealth of opportunities that spring from a British education.

# **Outstanding teaching**

In the UK, schools are either state schools funded by government and are free for all, or they're independent schools and charge fees to the parents of the pupils. There are some outstanding state schools across the country that provide exceptional teaching and care. Independent schools have an excellent reputation for high standards of teaching and learning and almost all pupils go on to prestigious universities when they leave. Pastoral care and attending to the mental and physical wellbeing of children is given a very high priority. Independent schools are able to give much more time for activities outside the classroom and have a reputation for excellence in sport, music, performing arts, outdoor education, community service and volunteering. Teachers in independent schools will know

the pupils in the classroom and also engage with them in co-curricular activities and through house systems, where pupils are grouped for pastoral care and friendly inter-house competition.

# A school for every child

There is a fantastic, and potentially bewildering, variety of schools: day schools; boarding schools; co-educational or single gender; all through (from ages three to 18) or schools that specialise in separate phases such as nursery schools, primary schools, secondary schools and sixth form colleges. Some schools offer boarding - these will vary between those where boarding is the main culture of the school or those where day pupils are in the majority. There are some variations between the systems in England and Wales and the curriculum in Scotland.

# **Examinations and qualifications**

This is true, for example, in the case of the examination system.

Scotland has its own system; in England and Wales, pupils will typically take examinations at age 16 in a range of around 10 to 12 academic subjects, some core, some chosen, called GCSEs. Some independent schools offer alternative courses at this stage. In the sixth form, most pupils will choose to specialise in three (or sometimes more) subjects and take A-level examinations at the age of 18. These provide the passports for university entrance. Some schools offer the International Baccalaureate which retains greater breadth at this level.

#### Universities and careers

Great British schools have a track record of launching young people into a dazzling array of universities and careers. The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge are global beacons of academic learning, with other leading institutions such as the London School of Economics and Political Science, Imperial College London and the University of Edinburgh also ranked in the highest echelon globally. That said, depending on the specific area of study, there's a wealth of courses within the UK's university system and the ranking of individual courses is more and more detailed. Many will also look further afield to Europe and beyond.

# **Broadening horizons**

With English being the leading language for learning, trade, diplomacy and travel, the

experience of studying and living in the UK as a child is invaluable. Echoing the ideas of Charles Darwin, one of the most well-known former pupils of Shrewsbury School, where I'm Headmaster, the process of evolution from child to adult is as complex as it is exciting. The best of British schools nurture and inspire each individual person throughout this process. These institutions provide the ecosystem, the environment, the challenge and the support for brilliant young minds to thrive.



# **Award-winning experience**

In October, Strathallan was presented with the International Student Experience award at the Independent Schools of the Year 2020 Awards. The award recognises 'the school that offers both the best and most holistic school life experience to the international students in their community'. Strict criteria must be met around international students' pastoral, academic and co-curricular experience. At Strathallan, we recognise and celebrate our pupils' international roots by marking key cultural events through assemblies, presentations and food festivals.

# **Extra English language support**

The school has extended its English as an Additional Language (EAL) provision by 300 per cent, allowing all international students to receive valuable additional English support at no extra cost, and new pre-A-level courses provide a bespoke academic programme in an immersive and nurturing environment ahead of sixth-form entry. Approximately 70 per cent of the pupils who completed one of these pre-A-level courses went on to become full time students at Strathallan.

Several key members of staff are responsible for the international student experience and instrumental in delivering its success. The Director of International Study Programmes oversees the courses, assists in ensuring our students are on the correct academic programme to suit both their strengths and their needs, and provides an important link between parents, agents and students. Operationally, the school's Chinese counsellor is responsible for overseeing the experience of our Chinese pupils specifically: providing individual support, advising teaching staff and communicating with parents to ensure our Chinese community is well supported.

# A warm welcome

The International Admissions Officer oversees the admissions process for international students and is the central contact for new pupils joining the school, maintaining communication and issuing all relevant information to facilitate a smooth admissions and induction process. This latter is a comprehensive two-day programme that gives new students and their families the opportunity to gain a clear understanding of what to expect, get to know key members of staff, peers, and other families, and be fully welcomed into the school family before the start of term. With parent meetings and alumni events all over the world, international families become and remain part of the Strathallan community for life.

# **Managing through the pandemic**

As one of the first schools to sign up to the Boarding Schools' Association's Covid-Safe Charter, the principles of safe distancing, thorough cleanliness practices and good personal hygiene have been at the heart of Strathallan's operational planning since the last summer. School management works closely with external consultants, as well as the School Medical Officer and qualified on-site medical staff to ensure appropriate measures and extensive contingency planning are up to date and operational. Our spacious facilities have allowed us even greater flexibility within Covid-Safe restrictions.

All pupils are issued a washable face mask, hand sanitiser, campus map and Pupil Handbook upon arrival, with mask-wearing and use of PPE applied in accordance with current guidance. Further to this, the school insists on a culture of tolerance and inclusion, with provisions made to ensure even pupils who may need to self-isolate are involved both academically and socially. A special provision put in place in September allowed all pupils to ease back into learning without the immediate pressure of academic work, and specific additional measures are in place through our sector-leading pastoral care programme, including the Wellbeing Well and enhanced individual tutor input for every pupil.

Regular, clear and comprehensive communication has also been of paramount importance for keeping pupils' families around the world informed of evolving developments. As well as regular updates and consultations, current risk assessments and key protocols are available to read through the Parent Portal. Strathallan School remains a safe, healthy and happy place for all pupils and staff.

# A varied extracurricular programme enriches all of our pupils' lives

One of the things that sets Strathallan apart is the scale of what's on offer across the school's 153 acres of safe Perthshire campus. With an extensive range of activities, Strathallan's extracurricular programme offers plenty of diverse experiences to explore new interests and discover hidden talents. From last September, this programme included over 70 different Covid-Safe clubs and activities spread across academia, the arts, health & wellbeing, military & outdoor, and sports interests. We're lucky to be able to respond to changes in advice from national governing bodies, with the space, resources and staff to allow us to adapt to ever-changing guidance. Old staples continue, such as jazz band and music ensembles, LAMDA, pipes and drums, ancient Greek and Christian Union, Duke of Edinburgh, CCF and John Muir, and more than 30 different sports, as well as new favourites, from ballet, Highland dance and photography, to robotics, medical ethics, yoga and mindfulness. 

# Innercity learning

DLD College London Principal, IRFAN LATIF, shares an insight into the innovative boarding experience provided for its overseas students in the heart of the UK's capital city

ritish boarding schools are considered as some of the most sought-after institutions in the worldwide education system, with students travelling from every corner of the world to reap the benefits of a residential education in the UK.

Located on a purpose-built, state-of-theart campus set in the heart of central London opposite Parliament, DLD College London is exceptionally unique. With more than 50 nationalities represented in our student body, we're an incredibly enriched, globally-minded school. We aim not to assimilate students to a British way of life, instead asking students to learn from each other.

In recent years, we've moved from a 'college with separate accommodation' model to an innovative, ground-breaking boarding school for students from the age of 14. Boarders live in en-suite bedrooms located on campus and take their meals in our Global Kitchen, which was officially opened by world-renowned Chef Atul Kochhar. Students are supported in their studies by staff with a wealth of experience

of helping international boarders, which in turn leads to a better understanding and higher attainment. Daily study clinics are led by academic staff members, and students can often be found discussing and debating elements of their courses around the house, both at evenings and weekends.

# **CAMPUS LIFE**

Our 250 boarders are housed in five 'huddles', each looked after by a 'huddle houseparent'. Our 19 common rooms have all been recently refurbished, and our recreational activities have been developed for evenings and weekends, contributing to the home-fromhome atmosphere our boarders enjoy. By implementing advanced boarding software into our security and lockdown procedures, we have secured boarders' safety. In a recent survey, 100 per cent of boarding students said they felt supported, safe and secure here.

This year at the Independent Schools of the Year 2020 Awards, we were delighted to win the award for Independent Boarding School of the Year and the Judges' Special Award, in >







recognition of our school's superior student wellbeing and urban boarding provision. The judges recognised DLD as a school that's 'brimming with energy' and 'offers something really special within the boarding sector for its students, combining old and new approaches to education'.

# SUPPORT AND WELLBEING

We're proud of our work in student personal development and are often recognised for our proactive and targeted pastoral care. Our wellbeing provision extends beyond the school day. Through the use of AS (Affective Social) Tracking, coaching methods, mentoring, nutrition, sleep education, and our new model of holistic pastoral care, our dedicated teams support our students in their studies, in creating and maintaining friendships, and learning the life skills necessary to progress. Students additionally have access to our awardwinning Wellbeing Centre.

One of our key aims is to develop an understanding of mental health for all students and staff and we've trained over 40 students in the Mental Health First Aid Youth qualification since 2018, aiming at destigmatising the mental health concerns. This is an incredibly important point, as students arrive with varying levels of acceptance of speaking and sharing their challenges. We're ensuring that the perception of education isn't solely on academic grades, but an understanding of themselves and each other. Our parents have also been trained in mental health first aid, so that they can continue to support their sons and daughters

when they're at home. By increasing our parental engagement with various forums, webinars and training opportunities, we've also moved our parents' evening online so that we can involve more of our international parents and families in their child's education and wellbeing, enabling them to also feel connected to the school.

To support students joining us, our in-depth induction programme for boarding includes visits from the local police about keeping safe in London, a real-life Monopoly Challenge to help boarders find their way around London using Oyster cards for the first time, and a sleep induction programme intended to equip boarders with ways of improving their own sleep patterns - particularly helpful for those adjusting to a significantly different time zone.

# SCHOOL COMMUNITY

To ensure a full experience of living in London, we encourage our students to engage with the local community through various projects. These include working at the local city farm and food bank, supporting campaigns for the local community centre and children's charities, and raising money for our school charity, Evelina London Children's Hospital. Our students reported to the ISI inspectors that that they see the value of 'serving rather than being served'.

Notably, throughout the Covid-19 pandemic, our school was proud to be declared as a



start of the first lockdown displayed excellent leadership and empathy when our remaining boarding students decided to create huge posters in support of key workers and NHS staff, displaying them in the school windows opposite St Thomas' Hospital. The initiative then evolved to children from around the UK and artists from around the world sending their NHS rainbow posters, which our students and staff collated and added to the gallery in the windows, with over 4,000 pictures displayed. During this time, their sense of social responsibility and sense of positive impact was central to their journey in support of those who supported the UK.

# SAFE AND SOUND

The Boarding Schools' Association issued a Covid-Safe Charter to ensure that pupil wellbeing is prioritised and parents stay reassured during the pandemic. DALE WILKINS tells us how it came together

hen BSA issued its first Covid-19-related guidance on 27 January, the virus hadn't yet reached the UK, and early concerns related entirely to travel to and from the affected areas of China. Boarding practitioners might have envisaged that this would be similar to the challenging, but ultimately manageable scenarios presented previously by SARS, MERS, H1N1 swine flu and avian flu. Early advice related to the difficulties of possibly accommodating additional children over Easter, and problems for some international boarders to get home. The wave of international lockdowns and the severe restrictions on air travel significantly changed that perspective, and very quickly the focus changed to considering how and when schools would be able to reopen safely, how boarding schools would be able adapt to new restrictions and whether boarders resident outside the UK would be able to travel safely between home and school.

Although some schools were able to close for the lockdown and move teaching online, many continued to accommodate both children of key workers and those who had difficulty getting home. The logistical obstacles were therefore twofold: looking after those who remained safely, and preparing for the challenge of reopening in September. BSA advice included links to the relevant guidance, a comprehensive checklist of considerations and engagement with the relevant authorities to ensure the issues facing schools were fully understood.

In May, BSA produced a Covid-Safe Charter, which was then adopted by the majority of member schools. The charter was not intended to override national guidance, but to give schools clear indicators on the operational guidelines they should be following as they moved towards reopening. It covers matters such as occupancy levels, cleaning regimes, distancing requirements and domestic arrangements. It also has clear expectations relating to communication with pupils and parents, particularly for those pupils who were travelling internationally. It also advocated the use of face coverings at a time when this was not universally accepted as a useful or appropriate measure for schools. In addition to being welcomed warmly by schools, the charter also offers reassurance to parents and pupils, demonstrating that schools are doing everything they can to ensure safety.

Since September, schools have continued to operate within the expectations of the charter, but have also been absorbing more guidance

# **FEATURES OF THE COVID-SAFE CHARTER**

# For international pupils upon arrival in the country...

- Ensure that the pupil is met by a named person, which could be a guardian who is aware of, and follows, social distancing.
- Ensure that the named person wears a face covering at all times when in proximity to the student in enclosed areas.
- Ensure that the journey to the school is direct, that the vehicle contains sanitiser and suitable wipes.\*

from across the UK, and responded to an evolving situation. This has included putting protective 'bubbles' in place within schools and boarding houses, which has allowed schools to provide safe and effective care for their boarding pupils.

Travel within and beyond the UK has become increasingly difficult, and many schools made arrangements to ensure that pupils were able to be accommodated over exeats and half-terms, which for international pupils is often in conjunction with host families and guardians. Crucially, all schools have had to adapt their procedures and will continue to do so in the coming year. They can be confident that they can respond swiftly and effectively to cases within school, or situations where pupils - particularly boarders - have potentially been in contact with people who have tested positive. For many schools, this has included ensuring access to testing, which in some cases has involved the schools purchasing testing equipment themselves.

In boarding schools, the fact that boarders aren't travelling frequently in the manner of day pupils has helped. For boarders, leaving site has now been stopped or restricted, meaning they're often in an even safer environment than their non-boarding classmates.

# A SOLID FOUNDATION

MMESOMA MICHELLE EMMA-NWAKANMA, 18 from Lagos, Nigeria is a Year 13 pupil at St Mary's Cambridge. She tells us why she came to study in the UK for her sixth form years

# Why did you want to come to study in the UK?

I was aware of the reputable education system and I knew that it would give me a solid foundation for my future career. Also, I have a few family members and friends that have schooled here and they all had positive things to say. And looking at each of them individually, I would say they have all become successful in the career path they've taken, and this is something I'd like to replicate.

# How did you and your family find out about St Mary's?

We found out about St Mary's School, Cambridge on the internet when searching for all girls' Catholic schools.

# What was the application process like?

The application process was very straightforward. I first enrolled online, then wrote entrance exams for two of my subjects (business and mathematics), after which I had an interview.

# Would your education have been very different if you had not gone overseas to study? And if so, how ..?

If I had stayed in Nigeria, I wouldn't have done A-levels and wouldn't have had the opportunity to explore my options. During my time in St Mary's Sixth Form, I've come across so many different university courses I can take, which is more than is being offered in Nigeria currently. Also, before I started



schooling in the UK, I wasn't aware of apprenticeships and this is something my school informed us about, so I started considering these too. Even though I didn't choose this route, it's good to know that I've researched broadly all my options and have finally chosen a course I know I want to do and not because there's nothing else to do!

# Did you have any concerns about coming to study here?

I didn't have many concerns because I knew some people who have studied here already. However, one thing I was worried about was the weather: I'd never been to the UK in winter and the cold is not something I'm used to and frankly, it's not something I like either! Another thing is

the way people talk which is different from where I'm from. It was challenging to understand at first, but as time went by, I began to understand people better.

# Did you have to quarantine when you returned to school here in September?

Yes, I quarantined in London for two weeks before I came back to school.

# How were you helped out when you first arrived at the school?

On arrival at the boarding house at school, I received such a warm welcome, and the support system was great: much better than I expected! Everyone was given a welcome booklet which had information about boarding like mealtimes, meeting times, rules and staff contact numbers. 

he excellence and high regard of a British education extends overseas. Research data estimates that there are approximately 6,000 British international schools around the globe. Some of these schools are branches or franchises of well-known UK independent schools such as Haileybury in Kazakhstan, Brighton College in the Middle East and Epsom College in Malaysia. # Gordonstoun **NOVA SCOTIA, CANADA**



Lisa Kerr, Principal of Gordonstoun in Moray, reveals how its new overseas outpost will continue the school's adventurous heritage

ordonstoun, in north-east Scotland was the first school to educate an heir to the British throne, and counts three generations of the British Royal family among its alumni.

Located between the Cairngorm National Park and the Moray Firth, the school pioneered the concept of character education. The Gordonstoun motto, Plus Est En Vous - 'there is more in you' - is as relevant today as it was when visionary educationalist, Dr Kurt Hahn, founded the school in 1934.

Hahn's vision was that young people needed to be challenged in order to develop the skills they would need for life, such as resilience, responsibility and compassion. The school's unique ethos combines academic achievement with exhilarating outdoor experiences and a strong commitment to voluntary service. The

Netflix drama series about the British Royal Family, The Crown, inaccurately depicted this as a tough regime of cross-country running and cold showers but the reality is that students spend time on an ocean-going sail training vessel, go camping in the Highlands and volunteer at the UK's only school-based fire station - all as part of the curriculum. HRH The Duke of Edinburgh was so inspired by his time at the school that he gave his name to The Duke of Edinburgh's Award which began as a Gordonstoun assessment and is now undertaken by children around the world.


Today, the school is expanding globally and in March 2020, it announced plans to open an overseas school in Nova Scotia.

Gordonstoun Nova Scotia will be located in a beautiful rural site which extends to approximately 250 acres, in Annapolis County. The campus lies between the sea and the hills, allowing a curriculum which will mirror that of its famous parent school.

Gordonstoun has always been an outwardlooking school, welcoming children from all over the world and building understanding and tolerance between people from diverse backgrounds and cultures. We believe that this educational ethos, which is central to the Gordonstoun curriculum, is what the world needs at the moment.

In Scotland, Gordonstoun has risen to the challenge of Covid-19 by moving even more lessons outside. Sail training, expeditions and voluntary service have continued following rigorous risk assessments and, if a child needs to self-isolate, they receive live online lessons.

Attending a school like Gordonstoun is an incredible opportunity for really exceptional young people who have a sense of adventure. They should be compassionate and empathetic and have the potential to be able to make a difference in the world. They don't have to be the finished article - we will develop their confidence, resilience, responsibility, teamworking skills and give them an international outlook - but they do need to have the right attitude to take advantage of the amazing opportunities on offer at Gordonstoun, whether in Scotland or Nova Scotia.



# Park House English School

Principal John Smith explains how the school's educational values, inclusive culture and specialist facilities are a recipe for success

ark House English School was founded in 1994 by Mrs Heather Brennan, a British headteacher looking to provide a high quality education to the expatriate and local community in Doha, Qatar. The Brennan family ownership continued until 2016, when the school was acquired by UKbased schools group, International School Partnership. We're proud of our history and continue to nurture the founding ethos, while bringing best practices from the UK into our teaching and learning. This ensures that our students achieve the highest levels of academic excellence and are equipped to deal with the demands of modern society. Significant numbers of our students attend UK universities each year.

Park House is a long-standing member of British Schools in the Middle East (BSME) and I'm privileged to serve as the Honorary Treasurer for the organisation. The advantages of BSME membership are numerous, with access to learning opportunities for our students and CPD for our staff. One particular area of note is the BSME Networks, which give staff the opportunity to engage in online CPD sessions ranging from subject specialisation to leadership training. Park House is a network lead school for MFL and Safeguarding and Safer Recruitment. We're also a member of COBIS, as this also opens up significant opportunities for our students and staff.

Students are between three and 18 years old and, while British children are our largest nationality group, we're proud to have more than 70 different nationalities represented in our community. Our core learning throughout all stages follows the National Curriculum for England. In the primary years it's enhanced by the International Primary Curriculum, while in secondary our students sit IGCSE and A-level examinations. We have all the specialist facilities needed to provide the programmes we offer, including ICT suites, science labs, music room (with music tech) and art spaces. We also have extensive sporting facilities: a 25m



swimming pool, AstroTurf, outside courts and a fully-equipped sports hall.

The emergence of Covid-19 has brought some interesting challenges. When schools closed in April, students were plunged into the depths of online learning. As a Microsoftcertified school, we had already developed the use of technology to support learning. This meant we were in a strong position to quickly transition to virtual learning. Schools opened up again in September, and we're currently operating with a daily rotation of 50 per cent of our students in line with strict safety measures. We've invested in new equipment, including thermographic cameras for temperature checks upon entry, particle sprayers for regular whole-site disinfection and hand sanitisers in corridors and classrooms. Staff and most students are required to wear face masks throughout the day. We have strict, regularly reinforced, social distancing guidelines, and in classrooms students are distanced from each other. While it's not what we ultimately want for our students, it's keeping our community safe and, most importantly, it allows high quality learning to continue.














# VARYING DEGREES

**THALIA THOMPSON** gives a breakdown of the types of higher education courses you can take at UK universities and institutions, as well as the careers advice and networking opportunities on offer

he UK is one of the world's most popular destinations for higher education with more than 450,000 international students. And it's easy to see why. There have been universities here for almost a thousand years and the 2021 QS university rankings show that the UK, a country with less than one per cent of the world's population, accounts for four of the top-ten universities in the world.

Impressive though these elite universities are, they're not the whole story. There are more than 100 universities and other higher education institutions, offering a first-class education to suit the needs of everyone.

# **Undergraduate courses**

Most undergraduate or bachelor's degrees in the UK last three years and are taught using a combination of lectures, seminars and tutorials, with practical or lab-based work where relevant.

Undergraduates can also apply to do integrated master's degrees. These follow the bachelor's course for three years and then, subject to achieving agreed grades, lead straight on to the master's programme.


As well as universities, there are also conservatoires which provide specialist education in music, dance and drama. Further education colleges offer qualifications such as a Higher National Diploma (HND) or Foundation degree (not the same as a Foundation year, see glossary). These courses have a strong vocational content and costs are usually lower. Both qualifications are equivalent to two years of a bachelor's degree and on completion you can normally continue your studies for a further year for a full degree.

# **Postgraduate courses**

Master's degrees can be taught or research based. A taught master's will involve a set timetable of lectures and seminars plus a dissertation. For a research master's or doctorate, you'll have guidance and support from an academic supervisor but the focus will be on your own thesis. Shorter postgraduate courses are also available, with a postgraduate certificate or diploma taking one or two terms respectively.

# Standards you can trust

High standards are guaranteed with an external examiner a requirement for all degrees. In addition, many courses in subjects like engineering or accountancy have been accredited by the relevant professional bodies.





## **Flexibility**

British university courses are focused but flexible. Typically, undergraduate students will follow a common first year in a given subject but will then pick modules to tailor the course to suit their interests. You also study for joint or combined honours, giving an even larger choice of modules. Study is intensive, but this means a degree can be completed sooner. For instance, a typical bachelor's degree takes three years in the UK but four in the US. Similarly, a master's usually takes a year in the UK but two years in the US and Australia.

# **Career opportunities**

Studying in the home of the English language, with teaching methods that encourage debate, produces individuals with the critical thinking and communication skills that employers prize. Universities have professional advisors to help make the most of your opportunities. For example, at the University of Birmingham as Elijah James,



Head of International Recruitment explains: "Careers network staff are committed to supporting graduates as they enter the world of employment – whether they need to talk through options, practice for interviews, or find the job that's right for them."

# **Supporting students**

Moving to another country can be daunting, but universities work hard to ensure international students settle in. There are student counselling and support services and pre-sessional induction courses. "We advise students on what they can expect, visa applications, and even suggestions of what to pack," says Ben Matthews, Head of Global Engagement at Lancaster University, "We offer flexible arrivals and arrange airport pick-ups with friendly student ambassadors."

# Valuing excellence

Despite the effects of the global pandemic it appears that demand remains strong, with UCAS figures reported in September showing a nine per cent increase in students from outside the EU. As Professor Bruce Rayton, Academic Director of Admissions at the University of Bath says, "We're determined to build on what we've learned through this crisis. Whatever situation we find ourselves in for the next academic year, our commitment is to providing a learning environment which continues to embed the skills and understanding that will be most valuable for our students, and most sought after by employers."

# **GLOSSARY**

Before filling in that UCAS form, get to grips with undergrad terminology

# **RUSSELL GROUP**

A group of 24 research-intensive universities. Taking their name from the Hotel Russell in London's Russell Square where the first meetings were held, this group of universities produce almost 70% of the UK's world-leading research.

#### **RED-BRICK UNIVERSITY**

The origins of this term goes back to Victorian times, when institutions, often specialising in valuable vocational skills such as engineering or medicine, became universities in their own right. It takes its name from the style of decorative brickwork used for public buildings at the time.

# **COLLEGIATE UNIVERSITY**

As well as belonging to a university and an academic faculty, students are also part of a smaller college community which can offer extra pastoral and academic support.

# **CAMPUS UNIVERSITY**

Student accommodation, teaching, research and leisure facilities are all together on one site.

# **FOUNDATION YEAR**

An access course for students who don't have quite the right qualifications for their chosen degree. Many universities offer International Foundation Years to help fill any academic gaps and ensure students have the English language and study skills they need. Students who successfully complete the foundation year automatically progress on to begin a bachelor's degree at the same university.

# **SANDWICH DEGREE**

Also known as a 'year in industry' degree, this includes a work placement in the second or third year of a four-year degree. This can give students invaluable professional experience. Applying for placements is competitive, but students are given support in the application process.





# YOUR HOME away FROMHOME

Studying far from home can be challenging but as **ELIZABETH IVENS** discovers, universities have dedicated resources in place to ensure their international cohort feel welcomed and cared for



ore than two million international students have chosen to study in the UK in the last decade, according to the British Council, with numbers continuing to rise despite the global coronavirus pandemic.

UCAS reported a nine per cent increase in international undergraduates in 2020/2021.

The rise signified not only a continued belief in the value of a British university education with its world-renowned academic reputation but also a validation of the outstanding pastoral care on offer.

Universities worked hard to ensure this care strengthened during the pandemic, introducing safety measures and protocols, and switching services online where necessary.

# **Putting the student first**

Experienced in accommodating growing numbers of international students, many universities have dedicated international teams and lay on programmes which are available as soon as a student accepts an offer.

Not only does this include help and advice on practical issues such as immigration, language needs and finance but increasingly on meeting present and future pastoral needs.

Study UK, an expert guide to British universities, spearheaded by the British Council, reported that many UK universities are 'going above and beyond to ensure that students' physical and mental health and wellbeing are prioritised'.

At University College London (UCL), one of four UK universities in the Top 20 of the Times Higher Education World University Rankings 2021, more than 20,000 students (nearly half of the university's entire cohort) are international.

Dr Valentina Seravalle, Senior Liaison and Recruitment Officer at UCL Student Recruitment, said UCL is rightly known as 'London's global university' with students coming from more than 150 countries.

The university has its own International Student Support (ISS) Team which runs an interactive programme where queries are answered by current or recent UCL graduates.

A finely tuned welcome package also involves 'countdown emails' focusing on topics including wellbeing, support services, settling in and campus life, and orientation webinars.


# **Pastoral care at university**

SOON AS A STUDENT ACCEPTS AN OFFER

Meanwhile, at the University of Cambridge, a quarter of its undergraduates and half of its postgraduates - a total of 9,000 of the university's 22,000 students – are international.

Head of the International Student Office, Anthony Dangerfield, said the nature of its collegiate system means pastoral care is provided throughout its 29 colleges.

He explained: "Pastoral care is provided through these colleges in the form of personal tutors and current student networks will help support arrival and orientation with initiatives such as a buddy system, which will see a fresher paired with an older student.



"Each college has its own nurse or counsellor and there are international student societies that can be joined."

Similarly, at Oxford University, Professor Martin Williams, Pro-Vice-Chancellor for Education said that international students experienced Oxford "primarily through their life in college, where there are college staff available for wellbeing support, as well as academic resources for those that need it, and many colleges have student international reps, who represent the interest of international students to college and offer peer support.

"Oxford University students come to an environment that is very international, and the life and support they receive reflects that." He added, "the university and colleges make provision for international students from pre-arrival to orientation and throughout their experience at their colleges and the university. There are clubs, societies and student organisations that cater to just about every culture and nationality represented in Oxford."

## Hitting the ground running

Back at UCL, Chris Bromley, International Student Advisor (UCL Study Abroad & International Student Support), said international students were prepared for life at UCL "from the moment a student accepts an offer," leading to an International Student Orientation Programme (ISOP) the week before teaching starts including talks on safety and security and wellbeing.

He added: "ISOP provides an opportunity for UCL to welcome the arrival of new international students. It's also a significant part of their preparation, with the programme providing information, advice and guidance to ensure they hit the ground running when teaching commences."

At the University of Hull in north-east England, where a growing number of international students account for more than one in ten of the student body, Pro-Vice-Chancellor (International) Philip M Gilmartin said international students were also supported from the time they accepted their offer to their first days on campus including overseas predeparture events. These events, normally held in person, switched to online in 2020 but, it is hoped, a mixture of face to face and online events will be held from 2021.

Professor Gilmartin said a full arrivals and induction service had been developed for students prior to them joining welcome week activities with all other students, supplemented by help from specialist practitioners.

He said: "At Hull there's a strong awareness throughout the institution that there can be added challenges when living and studying far from home, as well as cultural differences."

In Bath, support services include access to wellbeing advisers, with welfare and wellbeing drop-in sessions run daily for issues ranging from emotional difficulties to loneliness.

"You can talk to a wellbeing adviser about anything - they work hard to create a safe and inclusive space," said Ms Heijltjes.

International student wellbeing is also taken very seriously at UCL, with overseas students

being advised on how to access counselling and support services during their orientation process through the university's Student Support and Wellbeing team.

UCL's Chris Bromley explained: "A student's wellbeing and mental health is intrinsic to the quality of their degree and it's our job to ensure that international students studying at UCL are offered the best support possible."

## **Post-pandemic accessibility**

Meanwhile at Hull, which has the distinction of being the official university partner of Team GB right through to the Paris 2024 Olympics, a new international strategy is being launched this year and international postgraduate taught fees have been reduced to the level of home fees for September 2021 only.

Professor Gilmartin explained: "We really value what international students bring to campus life. We recognise the difficulties 2020 has presented to those seeking an international education, and in response to events like Covid-19 and Brexit we want to make sure students are still able to pursue that opportunity."



Hollywood A-lister CHRIS PINE reflects on his exchange year at the University of Leeds, and how the experience in and out of the lecture theatre broadened his career horizons

> ife now for Hollywood movie star Chris Pine Is a combination of many things - there's the obvious wealth and stardom; the creative and dramatic talent that has seen him portray Captain James Kirk (Star Trek), Steve Trevor in the reprised Wonder Woman and title character Jack Ryan in Paramount's eponymous \$60m blockbuster; he can even lay claim to being a pin-up, albeit mentions of this elicit only an uncomfortable laugh. It's all a far cry from student digs in Yorkshire, an English northern heartland whose natives are decorated and admired for their straight-talking, no-frills approach to life. As impressive as the University of Leeds is, both academically and architecturally,




Pine's decision to swap the sun-baked surrounds of Los Angeles for industrial city and sparse moorland surrounds - both rugged in their individual ways - has perhaps been one of the more surreal diversions made by a Tinseltown favourite.

And yet, looking for a UK base in which to undertake his exchange-year English studies, the University of California student landed in a place that would challenge and enrich him in ways he looks back on as wholly positive.

These days, the idea of the Chris Pine mooching around Leeds at the turn of the millennium seems far removed from what the 40 year old's life has become; and yet the actor recalls his experience with fondness, endorsing the thrill of studying abroad.

"To say I chose to study at Leeds and was determined to end up there is perhaps an example of an actor using a bit of creative and dramatic licence. In truth, my initial choices were for an exchange year in London or Glasgow. These were the places that all my tutors were talking about, and I think naturally overseas students focus in on the major cities in the UK, more out of habit and a bit of laziness. The fact I didn't get accepted at those places meant I was looking at alternative locations to study, but





looking back I don't think it could have worked out better for me.

"I had really gotten into drama in my second year in college at Berkeley, California, so Leeds University offered a lot in terms of activities that reflected my interest in creative arts, clubs and in societies.

"Additionally it was about the culture in and around the city - places like the Brudenell Social Club, like the small cinemas that were scattered around where we lived in the Hyde Park area.

"Coming to England was such an easy choice for me as an exchange student. Even back as a teenager I had such a passion for travel, for reading, for studying. What I found out about the University of Leeds was not only was it one of the best in the country, but it was also ideally located, and being in Yorkshire, with that gritty, wholesome personality that Yorkshire people have, there was so much music and social activity - so much food, design, nature, stunning scenery.

"Sure, you're at university to study, but Leeds presented itself in such a way that you could do what was necessary work-wise, as well as embedding yourself in a vibe that was so different to what I would have experienced had I studied in London, for instance.

"Student life was, as you can imagine, quite lively, but I never really had the stamina to be a big drinker. I could always cook, so would invariably sort Italian food for my housemates, with Bolognese being my speciality. I also invested a lot in local specialities - bread, pasties, Yorkshire cakes. I've always been blessed with a metabolism that is like a child's. so mostly I could eat whatever I wanted without any negative effects.

"In academic terms, Leeds offered students a lot of freedom to do their own thing and style their own type of degree, and I thought that was cool - that is a real feature of higher education in the UK. Of course we had set tasks and study processes, but there was a lot of trust built into what we were doing, and I loved that, particularly as I didn't know what I wanted to do with my life and never felt pushed down a specific path.

"At that age, you're constantly on the lookout for inspiration as far as a career goes, and I think you travel to some places expecting to find it. What Leeds taught me, as an institution, was that there wasn't a rush to decide. The personality of the university is to develop people, not careers. I never wanted to be an actor; I never even thought about it as a potential 'thing' until my second year, and first and foremost it was just a way to make friends.

"I think when you go abroad to study people imagine it's the language that is the barrier, and I guess if you are coming from a non-English speaking country then it will be; but for me it was much more about dealing with the Leeds accent, and that was a lot of fun... it was like nothing I had heard before!

"Leeds was a great time in my life. It was all totally different to studying in the US - a lot rawer, a lot more history, a lot more personality. I loved it - it was a great year in a great place."

## CLICK START YOUR FUTURE

From learning remotely to career advice, British ed tech solutions are leading the global IT response to Covid-19, says ELLA BUJOK

ne of the rising trends in 2020 across education was increased reliance on technology. Many schools closed their doors in the spring and their educators innovated to offer a blended-learning curriculum that would support students in the classroom, as well as remote settings.

E-learning platforms and software became critical solutions to ensure continuity of learning, and while technology will never match the experience of classroom learning, this focus on technology shined a light on some of the innovative and impactful resources that might have been overlooked before. School leaders have responded by affording curriculum leads to seek out new solutions to support their students.

Now more than ever, we need to invest time and money into adequately preparing students for the changing landscape of careers that lie before them. Focus should be given to the development of transferable skills across the curriculum. Helping students to develop a strong sense of self, through fun, age-appropriate assessments and skillbuilding lessons, also supports them to become comfortable with the skills needed to overcome transitions they will face now and in later life.

School leaders have told us that students are feeling demotivated about their futures, which has, in turn, put great pressure on teachers and parents everywhere to find innovative ways to reignite student excitement and re-establish that connection between what they learn in the classroom and how that impacts their futures.

## AN INNOVATIVE APPROACH

Xello is an online future-planning program that is built to engage students. As digital natives, students expect an experience to rival the sorts of apps they engage with on a regular basis. Xello can be accessed by students at schools that subscribe to the program, via desktop, laptop or mobile devices, enabling them to plan for their future 24/7.

Senior Education Consultant at Carfax Education, **SOPHIE OAKES,** gives an overview of all of the factors to consider when choosing a British education for your child

s we all know, it's wise to think ahead when it comes to planning your child's education. I regularly tell parents - the sooner the better. If, for example, you're planning to send your child to one of the top senior schools in the UK starting at the age of 13, you may well need to have registered your child for that school when he or she's 10 years old. The deadlines are strict and if you miss them, then it can be very difficult to make a late application, if at all. However, that applies to only a few schools and there are often later entry points that you can consider.

## Senior and sixth form

For sixth form education which spans the last two academic school years from ages 16 to 18, the deadlines for registration are generally between June and October the year before starting the following September. Pupils will generally sit admissions tests in the November and receive

their offers the first week of December. When considering a school for this stage of education, it's important to consider which curriculum will best suit your child. The most common choices will be between A-levels (three subjects) or the International Baccalaureate (six subjects): some schools offer both curriculums, but many focus solely on A-levels.

Entry assessments for different schools in the UK vary according to the age of entry and are often unique to each school. If you're applying internationally, schools will need to assess the level of spoken and written English. Some schools obviously require a high level of English for pupils to be able to access the curriculum while other schools have strong additional English support and are happy to accept a much lower level of English. The younger the student, the less likely it is the school will need to see a high level of English language skills. There's such a wealth of choice of educational opportunities that there is genuinely a school for everyone. It's worth talking to a professional to find





child's needs and abilities the best.

If you're under the age of 18 and are considering boarding in the UK it will be necessary to have a guardian based in the UK. There are many guardianship companies that can provide this service for your child, but it's important to make sure they're accredited by a governing body such as the BSA or Aegis UK, which upholds safeguarding and welfare issues of international boarding students.

## **Universities**

There's a central application portal for universities called UCAS, which acts as an intermediary between students and universities during the application process. Students can apply to up to five UK universities via UCAS but as you submit only one personal statement describing why you want to study a particular degree, it makes sense to apply to courses that are similar or aligned.

To gain a better understanding of where you might want to study, it's sensible to consider all the factors that are important to you in making a university choice. All universities will offer open days either on campus or currently these can be accessed virtually via websites and one-to-one meetings. These are very worthwhile and offer an insight into the courses on offer and that all-important student experience. Each course will have certain academic requirements, and for international students there will be a language requirement,

generally in the form of an IELTS or TOEFL test to determine your level of written, spoken and listening English fluency.

Applications are made between September 2021 and the final admissions deadline is 15 January, 2022 for entry in September 2022. If you're considering applying to either Oxford or Cambridge or a medical degree (including veterinary sciences) then the application deadline is 15 October, 2021. Offers are made conditional on academic results, between January to April before a September start.

## Playing it safe during a pandemic

Independent boarding schools have become havens of safety during the coronavirus pandemic. They are, in themselves, bubbles and have managed the threat of the virus extremely well. Most senior schools have the ability to isolate any child who is showing symptoms and they have kept their campuses open over half term and weekends when exeats would have taken place so that international parents don't have to worry about their child having to leave the grounds.

The universities reopened their doors at the start of the second wave of the Covid-19 pandemic. Initially, the response was slightly haphazard, however rapid on-site testing and isolation are now under control. Each university has its own practices, but these are perceived to be working.

## VISA REQUIREMENTS

As of 1 January, EU and non-EU students will have very similar visa routes to study in the UK

### **CHILD STUDENT VISA: SCHOOL**

If you're between four and 17 years of age and applying to study at an independent school in the UK, you'll need to get a Child Student Visa. These can be obtained up to six months before entering the UK and are replacing the current Tier 4 visas. You must have an offer of acceptance from the school you wish to study at before you can apply for the visa.

### STUDENT VISA: UNIVERSITY

If you're aged 16 or over and wish to study at higher education level, you can apply for a student visa through the Student Route. This is replacing the Tier 4 visa route. You can apply for this once the university has issued you a CAS (Confirmation of Acceptance) form. There is a fee to make this application and there's also a fee to be able to access the NHS (National Health Service). If you're on a Tier 4 visa, these are still valid.

### **GRADUATE VISA: A TWO-YEAR WORK EXPERIENCE VISA**

From this summer, international students will be able to benefit from two years' work experience through the new Graduate Route. The Graduate Route is a new UK post-study work visa enabling those students who have completed a degree at undergraduate level or above to stay and work in the UK. This route requires a new visa application and will include the payment of a visa fee and health surcharge as per above, www.gov.uk/ student-visa
